President's Report

Harvey Granatier, President

It is a pleasure to welcome you to the 56th Annual Meeting of the Sask K of C Charitable Foundation. Our Foundation is owned by all of the Knights of Columbus Councils within Saskatchewan. This meeting is an opportunity for each delegate from the Sask K of C Councils to provide guidance and direction for the future of our organization. We look forward to your active participation.

Our Board of Directors are extremely pleased and excited to present this report as 2025 has proven to be the most successful year financially in the history of the Sask K of C Charitable Foundation.

Our total assets grew to \$9.1 million, which represents a 20% increase from the prior year. Our earnings exceeded

\$2.0 million, which represented a 7.1% year over year increase. We must note that 50% of our profits came from unrealized gains on investments. It is prudent for us to realize that there will be market fluctuations that may create unrealized losses in future years. The Board of Directors recognized this eventual reality and established a reserve fund when they determined the distribution of profits for the year.

We are required by legislation to pay out 5% of our prior year's assets in grants and bursaries. This was reflected in the \$392,700.00 paid out to qualifying charities throughout our province. A total of \$200,000.00 was paid out from our Sask K of C Capital Endowment, and \$192,700.00 from the remaining thirteen Endowments.

There are a total of 174 Grant and Bursary applicants who will receive funding this year. A total of 27 organizations throughout the province will receive funding through our James & Lawrence Meier Food for Families program. A total of 102 applicants will receive Sask K of C Charitable Foundation cheques presented by those Councils that assisted in the sale of calendars this past year. We hope that we can continue to complement the financial and personnel contributions made by Councils in support of their faith and improving the quality of life for those in need within their communities.

As noted above, in addition to paying \$392,700.00 in Grants, we were able to establish a reserve fund of \$460,253.00, identified on our Annual Financial Statement as Net Assets. These reserve funds provide a contingency funding source to support future grant and bursary payments in years when annual earnings are insufficient to meet the 5% legislated requirement. This will assure our commitment to all donors that we will not spend any of the dollars they donated to cover Grants and/or operating expenses. All donated funds will continue to earn revenue in perpetuity for the payment of Grants and Bursaries.

We are also proud to advise that our total operating expenses were only \$55,500.00 for the year. This represents 0.59% of total assets, which is unbelievable when compared with similar sized Foundations and non-Profits. This donation of time and expertise at zero remuneration is a testament to the commitment of our volunteer Board members. We realize that these commitments from volunteers are not sustainable in the future, and will continue to work together with councils to increase revenues for eventual hiring of full-time paid personnel.

The Sask K of C Vocation Endowment ended the year with a principal balance of \$1,983,271.00. This year, we will provide each of the eight Seminarians within our province with a cheque for \$11,425.00 to assist in their annual education and development. The Sask K of C

Vocations Endowment Fund also makes our members and parishioners aware of the need to offer encouragement and prayer for those pursuing or considering a vocation to the priesthood.

We will once again apply to K of C Supreme Council for their contribution to Seminarian support through the RSVP program. This year, their 20% of the total funds paid out will provide a donation of \$18,280.00 to the Sask K of C Vocation Endowment Fund.

Coats for Kids once again proved to be a very successful and gratifying program. Through a partnership with Sask State and Supreme Council, our Foundation assisted in funding the purchase and distribution of 573 boxes of coats. Boxes were then purchased by Councils and distributed throughout their respective communities. A significant number of the boxes were purchased and distributed through a strategic relationship established with First Nations Tribal Councils and Band Offices. This relationship proved to be an excellent medium for assisting those in need.

In total, 6,876 coats were provided to our youth throughout the province. A true exemplification of the lesson of Charity.

The Sask K of C Charitable Foundation Calendar project continues to gain traction and has resulted in 4,884 calendars sold throughout the province. In addition to providing much-needed revenue, the opportunity to have 4884 calendars in homes throughout Saskatchewan is an excellent medium to increase awareness and understanding of the many examples of Charitable giving performed by Knights of Columbus within our province. It would be very exciting if all councils made an effort to participate in this valued project.

In response to the devastation of homes in northern Saskatchewan this past summer, the Sask K of C Charitable Foundation initiated a fundraising effort to assist those directly impacted. In conjunction with the Archdiocese of Keewatin Le Pas, we were able to offer funds to two families from La Ronge, Sask, who had lost their homes. The heartfelt letters of appreciation received from the two families substantiated the value of our gift at a very difficult time in their lives.

We are proud of our continued support for post-secondary education and training for youth within the families of our Knights of Columbus members. Through the Adrienne and Mervyn Welter Education Endowment, we provide nine bursaries through the three Catholic Colleges in Saskatchewan. The Champion College Knights Council Endowment provides a bursary to a student enrolled at Champion College, and the Sask K of C Capital Endowment provides four bursaries to students at Sask Polytechnic Institute and one bursary to a student enrolled at St. Therese Institute in Bruno. To qualify for any of the 15 bursaries, the applicant must be a Knight, spouse, child or grandchild of a Knight of Columbus in Saskatchewan.

We are pleased to participate as a partner with the Regina Chapter in the annual Knights of Columbus Carol Festival. This project brings pleasure through the enjoyment of music, supports keeping Christ in Christmas, and offers funding to four worthy Charities. We look forward to supporting the growth of this valued project in the future.

The Sask K of C Charitable Foundation would like to express our appreciation to State Deputy Marty, State Officers, State Directors and staff for their valued support this past year. A strong provincial team effort, in partnership with our Councils, will continue to be mutually beneficial in our efforts to support our Catholic faith and improve the quality of life for those less fortunate within Saskatchewan.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Saskatchewan Knights of Columbus Charitable Foundation

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Saskatchewan Knights of Columbus Charitable Foundation (the Entity), which comprise:

- the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2025
- the statement of operations and changes in net assets for the year then ended
- the statement of cash flows for the year then ended
- and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies (Hereinafter referred to as the "financial statements").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at December 31, 2025, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "***Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements***" section of our auditor's report.

We are independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.



Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2025

Nature of operations:

Saskatchewan Knights of Columbus Charitable Foundation (the "Entity") was formed to promote, finance and assist charitable projects for all people without distinction as to race, colour or creed. The Foundation was incorporated under the *Societies Act* and continued under *The Not-For-Profit Corporation Act of Saskatchewan*. The Foundation is a charitable receipt organization (charity # 134432327) and is exempt from income taxes under Section 149 of the Canadian *Income Tax Act*.

1. Significant accounting policies:

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The Entity's significant accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Basis of presentation:

The Foundation utilizes the restricted fund method of accounting. For accounting and financial reporting purposes the Foundation classifies the resources which it holds into the following funds:

Endowment and Special Purpose Funds

The Endowment and Special Purpose Fund reflects amounts donated or bequeathed to the Foundation where the donor identifies the funds as restricted funds. In making such endowed donations, donors may suggest that the contributions be used for a specific charitable purpose, make specific recommendations regarding the charitable use from time to time, make a contribution for the broad charitable purpose of the Foundation, or make a contribution where the investment income earned net of administration expenses is used for the administration of the Foundation and, except in unusual circumstances, it is the practice of the Foundation to follow such suggestions where it is permitted to do so by applicable laws.

(a) Basis of presentation (continued):

A & M Welter Endowment

The A&M Welter Endowment fund provides grants for bursaries, programs and projects that support Catholic education.

Brother Isidore Endowment

The Brother Isidore Endowment fund is to support the education and development of individuals in pursuit of a religious vocation as well as to support the general purposes and programs of the Foundation.

Campion Knights Endowment

Campion Knights Endowment fund is to support the general purposes and programs of the Foundation. The annual priority is to provide an alumnus of Mother Teresa Middle School with a \$1,000 bursary for tuition at University of Regina Campion College Campus.

Joseph M Glasser Endowment

The Joseph M Glasser Endowment fund supports the general purposes and programs of the Foundation.

Indigenous Non-Indigenous Relations Endowment

The Indigenous Non-Indigenous Relations Endowment fund supports grants for organizations, programs and projects that encourage indigenous and non-indigenous relations.

Sask K of C Capital Endowment

The Sask K of C Capital Endowment fund was established in 2025 by transferring \$3,641,347 from the General Fund to the Endowment and Special Purpose Funds. Its purpose is to provide funding to support grant payments.

Sask K of C Vocations Endowment

The Sask K of C Vocations Endowment fund is to assist in the education and development of Seminarians.

(a) Basis of presentation (continued):

Other Endowment Funds

The purpose of following endowment funds are to support the general purposes and programs of the Foundation: Fr. O'Leary Columbian Endowment, M & P DeSchryver Endowment, H & S Pisiak Endowment, A & M Schamber Endowment, George L Lewans Endowment, J & B Sidloski Endowment, and C & M Schneider Endowment.

General Fund

The General Fund reports resources allocated for the Foundation's general operations and administration.

(b) Financial assets and liabilities:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Subsequently, investments, with the exception of term deposits and GIC's, are accounted for at their fair values, which are determined based on closing market values at year-end. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method. Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Foundation determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial assets. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial assets or the amount the Foundation expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

(c) Income taxes:

The Foundation is a registered charity and no income taxes are payable on reported income under paragraph 149(1) (f) of the *Income Tax Act*.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(d) Revenue recognition:

The Foundation follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions, which includes donations. Contributions and donations are recognized on the earlier of when they are received and when the rights of ownership have been transferred to the Foundation. Fundraising revenues are recognized when received.

Bequests are recorded upon receipt of the donated assets.

Interest on investments is recorded on the accrual basis. Investment income consists of interest and dividend distributions.

(e) Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported assets and liabilities and disclosure of amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates include the valuation of the Foundation's investments.

4. Financial risks:

(a) Market risk:

The Foundation is exposed to market risk on its equity and income funds and preferred share investments due to changing market conditions. Given the current geopolitical environment, volatility in interest rates and equity values can impact the value of the Foundation's investments. The Foundation manages this risk by establishing and monitoring asset allocation strategies and diversifying its investments.

(b) Credit risk:

The Foundation's principal financial assets are cash, accounts receivable and investments. The carrying amounts of financial assets on the statement of financial position represent the Foundation's maximum credit exposure at the statement of financial position date. Credit risk is limited as the Foundation's cash and investments are held with chartered banks with high credit ratings assigned by national credit rating agencies. The Foundation monitors its receivables and provides for any amounts that are not collectible.

(c) Liquidity risk:

The Foundation manages its liquidity risk by maintaining adequate cash and investments, preparing operating budgets and reviewing the cash flow needs of the Foundation on a regular basis.

(d) Interest rate risk:

The Foundation is exposed to interest rate risk on its investment in bonds, term deposits and GIC's. Information about the interest rates and maturities of these investments is provided in note 2.

The Foundation's financial risks have not significantly changed since the prior year.

Investments Report

Except for March and April, the market was fantastic in 2025, with gains made in both equities and preferred shares in ten of twelve months. 2025 did have a Santa Claus rally, but not as large as I would have liked it to be. However, the market rebounded through the 1st quarter of 2026, causing cautious optimism for 2026. March, however, saw a decline in the market due to the War in the Middle East, which caused oil prices to spike and increase the cost of living. Due to the many other unknowns, such as inflation, Bank of Canada interest rates, and political expediency (elections), it is becoming very difficult to make an educated investment.

Our returns for 2025 were, in my opinion, very good, 6.15% on Invested Capital excluding realized Capital Gains. 6.31% including realized Capital Gains and 21.54% including unrealized Capital gains.

The strong Bull market resulted in our incurring a write-up of \$1,068,091 in our portfolio. This write-up places our portfolio at approximately 1.2 million above cost. **These write-ups or write-downs will occur annually.** This write-up did not increase our 2025 earned income, nor will it affect our 2026 income significantly, but it will affect our total Assets and thus increase our disbursement quota. Our quota is 4.82% of the average assets of the past two years (this year's write-up created an increase of approximately \$51,000). This increase, coupled with the increase last year due to the write-up (\$45,000), caused our disbursement quota to increase by \$96,000 due to the increase in the value of our portfolio in the past two years.

Although we invest for income rather than growth, Capital gains and losses do occur from time to time. In 2025, we realized a Capital gain of \$11,044, mostly due to redemptions of reset preferred shares and the takeover of CI Financial by an Asset management company from the UAE. Both the earnings on Assets under management (AUM) and on Invested Capital have been provided to present a more accurate report on our investment performance. At present, Preferred shares are no longer depressed, thus high-yielding, high-quality shares at bargain prices are hard to find.

The Fate of the 2026 market will probably be determined by the length of the War in the Middle East and how quickly a new CUSMA is signed. There are so many wild cards in play that it is difficult to make an accurate prediction. I do, however, believe we are well-positioned and will be just fine.

Marketing & Communications Committee Report

Continuing the work initiated in 2024, the Marketing & Communications Committee (MarCom) remained focused throughout 2025 on strengthening awareness of the Foundation among all Knights in Saskatchewan—our owners—as well as presenting a consistent, professional image to donors, partners, and supporters.

A key part of this strategy was the adoption of monthly communication themes. 2. Website

- **Weekly postings** aligned with monthly communication themes.
- **Regular updates** featuring cheque presentations for Coats for Kids, Jackets for Council Chaplains, and other Foundation news.
- **Formal Website Review**
MarCom conducted a structured review, including a user survey. Several incremental improvements were implemented, with more enhancements expected for 2026.

3. Weekly Newsletter

A formal review of the newsletter was initiated this year, resulting in several improvements that will continue to be refined in future editions.

The weekly newsletter continues to mirror the communication themes featured on the website, including cheque presentations and recipient impact stories.

4. Brand Recognition

Working closely with the Board, MarCom has consistently encouraged the Foundation’s unique strengths, as well as promoted and visually represented the Sask K of C Charitable Foundation as a distinct entity. We are:

Coats for Kids Report

In 2025, Sask K of C Charitable Foundation, together with Supreme Council and Sask State Board, were able to secure and make 6384 winter coats available to those in need. In order to achieve this remarkable number, Sask K of C Foundation once again partnered directly with the Knights of Columbus Councils and many First Nations Communities and Bands throughout the province.

This year, we had 28 Councils participate in our program, distributing 131 boxes for a total of 1572 coats. Our First Nations partners distributed 401 boxes for a total of 4812 coats throughout their communities.

We were extremely pleased to keep the price of the coats at \$200.00 per box or \$16.67 per coat. In total, \$106,400 was raised and spent on keeping our youth warm and allowing them to participate in winter activities with their peers. This has been a great project over the past few years as we have succeeded in distributing over 42,000 winter coats in Saskatchewan. Thanks to all who participated over the years.

It is the intent of the Sask K of C Charitable Foundation to once again offer the Coats for Kids program this fall. Please contact me if you have any questions on how to get involved.
